

A North Lincolnshire success story

Barton upon Humber's Nancy Birtwhistle won the BBC's Great British Bake Off competition in 2014. This was "totally life changing - in a good way".

Her new career saw her travelling to London weekly to fulfil a schedule packed with interviews, magazine articles, baking demonstrations and speeches. However, she comments, 'I have to say sincerely that although work involved travelling and seeing all parts of Britain - I am always pleased to get back home to North Lincolnshire'.

As a professional baker she is fond of the 'abundance of food that North Lincolnshire grows'. She also is a fan of the outdoors, therefore enjoys North Lincolnshire's natural landscapes and walking her beloved dogs. She recommends a walk on the Humber Bank as it makes her 'totally at one with the elements and wildlife'.

Barton, her home town, she describes as 'a small, friendly community and its surrounding villages boast beauty and tranquillity'. This reflects North Lincolnshire's peaceful environment but the 'hustle and bustle of city life' can also be found in places such as Scunthorpe, Brigg and Epworth. Therefore, North Lincolnshire is ideal for all types of people from food enthusiasts to cyclists.

Archaeologists re-excavating (1970)



The world's longest single-span suspension bridge which includes a cycle and footpath route.


The Humber Bridge is an internationally recognised masterpiece of engineering that once held the world record for the longest single-span suspension bridge for 16 consecutive years.





Wrawby Postmill





Portrait of Samuel Wilderspin (1791–1866), English educationist.

Samuel Wilderspin was a well-known educator in the 19th Century. He published works such as 'On the Importance of educating the Infant Poor' in 1823. Amongst other credits he is known for the introduction of playgrounds to schools. He taught for several years until his retirement at Wilderspin School. The school is in Barton upon Humber and is now a museum open regularly to visitors.

Ted Lewis (1940 – 1982) was a popular North Lincolnshire Novelist, Graphic Designer and Jazz Pianist.

Edward Arthur “Ted” Lewis of Barton upon Humber, most famous for the film *Get Carter*, wrote eight other novels, two featuring his home town, the rest, innovative ‘noir’ or dark thrillers. His most prestigious graphic achievement was as clean up supervisor on *The Beatles*, *Yellow Submarine* and he also played piano with *Unity Jazz Band*.






The Ropewalk is a centre for the arts, live performance, café and museum. The building was once known for rope making. Originally opened in 1767, the ropery is a Grade II listed building with a one-quarter mile long pantile roof.


Sir Isaac Pitman

In the 19th Century Sir Isaac Pitman (1813 - 1897) was a key figure in linguistics and education. He originally came from Barton upon Humber. Knighted by the Queen, Pitman is now universally remembered for his contribution to the linguistics sector. He is credited for the development of the shorthand writing system, which to this day is used by journalists and writers.


John Harrison


John Harrison (1693 - 1776) moved to Barrow upon Humber at a very young age and lived there until 1738. John Harrison invented the marine chronometer, a long-sought after device for solving the problem of calculating longitude while at sea. His solution revolutionised navigation and is credited for greatly increasing the safety of long-distance sea travel.

An interesting exhibition on his life, inventions and trials is held in the Holy Trinity Church in Barrow together with a full-size copy of the famous portrait.






Elsham Hall Gardens & Country Park

Thornton Abbey & Gatehouse



Once home to the Black Canons, Thornton Abbey and Gatehouse is an architectural delight in North Lincolnshire. Built in response to the Peasant's Revolt in the 12th Century, this ornate gatehouse offered personal and spiritual protection to its inhabitants. Lying on the horizon you can still see the abbey's ruins with parts of the atmospheric Chapter House still standing proud and tall.




Winterton Fortuna Mosaic

The Romans flourished in North Lincolnshire. They built impressive villas which left behind lots of interesting archaeology. This is a mosaic depicting the goddess Fortuna from Winterton Villa. The site was discovered by chance in 1797 when a sudden rain shower forced William Fowler of Winterton to take cover in a ditch with some local school boys. The boys amused themselves throwing clods of mud at each other and digging with sticks. By chance they uncovered something most interesting, the edge of the Fortuna Mosaic.

Winterton Cup

The enamelled copper alloy Winterton Cup is one of a group of similar vessels thought to be soldier's souvenirs from Hadrian's Wall. The decoration may represent Hadrian's Wall, with the enamelled squares echoing the stone blocks it was built from.

The Winterton Cup is an example of the Romano-British tradition of producing enamelled vessels, a survival of Celtic tradition into the Roman period and an exclusive relic of the Roman Empire. This colourful cup was found by a metal detectorist in Winterton, North Lincolnshire.

Plesiosaur Tail & Flippers

Millions of years ago, the land that is now North Lincolnshire was at the bottom of the sea. During the Jurassic Period, Plesiosaurs roamed the sea that covered our area.

A rare find of the back part of a Plesiosaurs was discovered in a North Lincolnshire ironstone quarry. Unfortunately, the front half had been removed a decade earlier by a giant dragline digger. ▶




Jadeite Axe

◀ The Jadeite Axe has been found to originate from the Italian Alps in around 4300BC. The axe is believed to have made its way to Wroot, North Lincolnshire in 3900BC. The axe was not intended for use and would have been a ritual object.



The Ironstone Cottage



In 1963, the project to rebuild one of Scunthorpe's iron worker cottages began on museum grounds. The cottages that stood on Church Street were demolished in preparation for a new modern housing development. It was agreed that an example of the cottages needed to be remembered. Using material from two of the Church Street cottages a rebuild of a cottage was made, taking an estimated three months to complete.

Convalescent homes or Auxillary Hospitals were formed by the British Red Cross and other organisations to provide a safe place for soldiers to recover, easing the pressure off the large military hospitals.

Auxiliary hospitals included large general hospitals and thousands of smaller premises volunteered for war service. These included town halls, recreation halls, schools, infirmaries, large and small private houses, cottages, garages and even stables were all put to use.



NORMANBY HALL

Country Park

Normanby Hall was offered for use as a hospital and on 19 November 1914, Normanby Park Auxiliary Hospital opened with 25 beds.

By 1919 the number of beds had grown to 75. During the hall's time as a hospital, 1,248 men were treated there.

You can now see what the hospital may have looked like in the permanent First World War exhibition in Normanby Hall.



The Great Bear Model Railway

This is a model of the Great Western Railway Pacific class engine, "The Great Bear". It was built for Sir Berkeley Sheffield in 1910 by James Carson & Co. Ltd. of Cricklewood. Sir Berkeley was a Director of the Great Western Railway. He built a miniature railway track at Normanby to train his sons in the mechanics of railway operation.

After the death of Sir Berkeley in 1946, the locomotives and tracks were sold. In the 1960s, the Scunthorpe Society of Model Engineers brought a miniature railway back to Normanby. In June 2006, a new track was laid close to the site of the original and the Great Bear returned home.

Horse & Rider sculptures by Harold Gosney

These life-sized Horse and Rider sculptures were created by Harold Gosney in 2011. One is the wooden former, and the other is the sculpture made by beating copper onto the former.

The Horse and Rider sculptures can be seen in the Stables at Normanby Hall Country Park.



British Steel

The steel making industry is a large part of Scunthorpe's past and present. It has assisted in developing the town into one of the most valued industrial towns in the UK.

The industry also helped develop the town's community. In the Census of 1851 the total population of the villages Scunthorpe, Ashby, Brumby, Crosby and Frodingham combined was 1,245 people. When ironstone was discovered in 1859 the villages grew massively and in 1875 the population was an estimated 4,000 people.

The steelworks remain an important industry in North Lincolnshire and was renamed British Steel in 2016.



In 2015 local man Mal Nicolson returned to Keadby, North Lincolnshire from Portugal sailing the only known replica of the topsail schooner **HMS Pickle**. The original ship was purchased as tender at Jamaica Station. HMS Pickle was present in 1805 at The Battle of Trafalgar, however was too small to take part. The ship returned to Great Britain to deliver the news of Nelson's victory. She was the fastest ship in Nelson's fleet and most likely the fastest in the world at that time!

You can now visit the restored replica of HMS Pickle in all its glory at Keadby Canal along with the iconic Humber Super Sloop Spider T.

DRAGON

Dragonby: A tale of dragons & wizards

Local legend has it that this is the remains of a dragon, turned to stone by a local wizard. The dragon's long spiked back has been a point of local interest for hundreds, perhaps thousands of years. It is actually a natural rock outcrop formed by a lime rich spring depositing stone.





Every January for the past 700 years or so in the Isle of Axholme a Medieval 'sway' has taken place. The Haxey Hood is a folklore brawl over a Lady's hood where two teams toss and turn for possession of the glorious hood. The fool spurs on the crowd with his taunts "*Oose agen oose, toon agen toon, If a man meets a man, knock 'im doon, But d'oant 'ot' im*". Translated this reads "*House against house, town against town, if you meet a man, knock him down but don't hurt him*".


Epworth Old Rectory

The Mowbrays

Mowbray's Manor


Excavations have revealed that on the site beside St Andrew's Church Epworth, now known as 'Vinegarth', stood the manor house belonging to the Mowbrays. One of medieval England's most powerful families, in the fourteenth century the Mowbrays were created Dukes of Norfolk. William de Mowbray, one of the rebel barons who witnessed the sealing of Magna Carta in 1215, died here in 1224, but his grand residence has long since disappeared.

Epworth has a rich history and heritage. Did you know the founders of the world Methodist Movement John and Charles Wesley, were born in Epworth? The Wesley family lived in the Old Rectory and were even denied permission to preach due to their innovative beliefs. John Wesley reportedly took action by preaching on his father's large tomb stone outside St Andrew's Church, which still stands. Today you can learn more about the Wesley family by following the Wesley Trail around Epworth. Then why not browse the independent shops and places to eat whilst discovering the town's fascinating history.



Northern Lincolnshire Aviation Heritage

In February 1945 Hibaldstow Airfield made national news. WAAF Margaret Horton took the flight of her life when she climbed aboard a Spitfire's tail. This was common practice to keep the tail down during windy days, however most people would get off before the flight took place. Pilot Neill Cox took flight, unaware Margaret was sitting on the tail. Once landed, the pilot was informed he had flown with Margaret hanging on to the back. Margaret was nowhere to be seen, she had joined the queue for a cup of tea. We are sure she needed it!

"Breaking the record was an ultimate achievement and a dream come true" said Becci. This is a real team effort with Becci's husband modifying her bike for all her races and record breaking attempts.

Becci realised her passion was for motorcycles and her first motorcycle was a Honda C70. She now races her modified Suzuki Hayabusa - her favourite racing bike.



Barton upon Humber is home to perhaps one of the biggest annual motorcycle events in the UK, Barton Bike Night. Every July up to 20,000 motorcycle enthusiasts descend on the town. You don't have to be a keen motorcyclist to enjoy this event. It is well known for its great atmosphere and one for all the family to attend. This event is run by hardworking volunteers.

Crowle Moors

Presently the tract of Thorne, Goole, Hatfield and Crowle Moors is but a remnant of the vast complex of bog, fen and moor that once surrounded the head of the Humber estuary including much of North Lincolnshire's Isle of Axholme. It is internationally important for the nocturnal Nightjar and is the only site in Lincolnshire to support the Large heath butterfly. Other important plants found on the moors include Bog rosemary, Sphagnum moss and the carnivorous Sundew.

Flora & Fauna of North Lincolnshire

From the lush green Ancholme Valley to the mysterious Crowle Moors, North Lincolnshire is a treasure trove of unusual plants, flowers, fauna and beautiful rare birds.

Animals

| **Roe deer** | This majestic, native species was declared extinct from England in 1800. During the Victorian era reintroductions were made and now roe deer flourish in Britain's countryside.

| **Red fox** | The largest of the true foxes this species is known for its adaptability.

| **Otter** | After years of decline otters are making a comeback and can now be found throughout much of North Lincolnshire. They are territorial, capable of protecting 25 miles of territory.

| **Pink-footed goose** | In the autumn, up to 8000 Pink-footed geese may be seen around Read's Island, commuting daily to feed on farmland around the Wolds.

| **Common buzzard** | This species is also making a comeback. This bird of prey now breeds throughout North Lincolnshire.

| **Bearded tit** | Throughout the years it has been debated what family this small reedbed bird belongs to. Recently research suggests it may be a unique songbird.



Plants

| **Sundew** | This carnivorous species traps passing insects on specialised leaves with tendrils tipped with a sticky liquid. The leaves wrap round the prey, which is then digested using enzymes.

| **Lily of the valley** | In the 17th, 18th and 19th centuries these sweet-smelling flowers were collected from Broughton Woods to be sold locally. The Duchess of Cambridge's wedding bouquet contained this flower.

| **Southern march orchid** | Typically growing between 30m to 50m in height this specimen thrives in damp or marshy environments.

| **Wild cherry tree** | The wild cherry tree is known for its rich, pink flowers and deep red cherry fruit.

| **Silver birch tree** | Native to Britain, this elegant tree improves soil quality, which benefits neighbouring plant growth by recycling its nutrients onto the soil through its dropped leaves.

| **Harebell** | This delicate, vibrant blue or purple flower flourishes on dry and sandy landscapes.

What can you see?



Locations

| **Crowle Moors, Humberhead Peatlands National Nature Reserve** | This reserve offers a large range of habitats, such as wet woodland and peatland. It's abundant with wildlife and is home to thousands of plant, insect and animal species.

| **Alkborough Flats** | This nature reserve is a 440 hectare site next to the rivers Trent and Ouse. Water birds are ever present here including Redshank, Curlew, Shelduck, Teal and Wigeon. You could be lucky enough to even see an otter.



| **Far Ings National Nature Reserve** | At this nature reserve you relax in the presence of peaceful wildlife. Watch Bearded tits and Marsh harrier in their natural habitat. Enjoy the lakes that hold fish where Herons and Grebes are frequently spotted.

| **Waters' Edge Country Park** | With ponds, reedbeds, native woodland, walking trails and playgrounds, this reserve is ideal for family trips.

| **Brumby Wood Local Nature Reserve** | This ancient semi-natural woodland is home to various tree species including Ash, Oak, Sycamore, Small-leaved lime, Chestnut and Elm.



Peace, tranquillity, plentiful wildlife and an ever-changing environment await you at Alkborough Flats, where the rivers Trent and Ouse join to form the Humber estuary.

Thousands of wading birds and wildfowl use the site during the autumn and winter months. It is also a wonderful place to get good views of Bearded tit and Little egret. A network of footpaths, hides and information panels will help you explore and discover more about this fascinating site.





The first known recording of this medieval turf maze was in 1697 by local curate Abraham de la Pryme. This complex and intricately designed maze has been marvelled by visitors and local residents for hundreds of years. It is a great location for any budding photographer and is even a well known for spot for marriage proposals.

Gunpowder, treason and plot! Bonfire night is an annual event dating back to the 1600s when plotters failed to overthrow King James I of England and his parliament. Known as the Gunpowder Plot it is one of the most well known events in British history. It is said that Twigmoor Woods was where John Wright, a resident of Twigmore Grange, secretly plotted with his companions. This included his famous school friend, Guy Fawkes.

Twigmoor Woods is now known for its beautiful display of multi-coloured rhododendrons and varied habitats for wildlife, particularly birds like Woodpeckers and Common warblers. However, the woods are still remembered for their eerie past in many of England's history books.

Twigmoor Woods is a 130 acre privately owned woodland with some access open to the public.






Experience Bottesford

In the Later Bronze Age there was a move away from burying the dead; few graves of this date are known. Bodies were possibly burnt and the ashes and grave goods thrown into rivers. This may help explain why many fine metal objects have been found in rivers.

Other objects were not grave goods. Axes, spearheads, knives and swords were deposited singly or in groups, either on dry land or in bogs, rivers or lakes. Such deposits were clearly votive offerings, occasionally broken and carefully placed.







Lemon Cheesecake with Strawberries

A fantastic dessert for the summer which, with a little thought about decoration, can really impress your friends. It is incredibly easy and can be made the day before. Fresh, sweet seasonal strawberries with a tangy yet creamy filling sitting on a thin crisp biscuit base makes for the perfect cheesecake.

Serves 10-12

You will need a 9 inch loose bottomed springform tin base. Line the sides of the tin with a strip of acetate.



Ingredients

For the base

- 110g plain digestive biscuits (9 biscuits)
- 40g butter
- ½ tsp ground star anise

For the lemon curd

- 75g caster sugar
- 50g butter
- 2 eggs
- Zest and juice of 1 lemon

For the filling

- 300g fresh strawberries (small fruits)
- 500g mascarpone cheese
- 120ml milk
- 4 gelatine leaves
- 180g icing sugar
- Zest and juice of 1 large lemon or 2 small
- Made lemon curd (above) or 200g from a jar
- ½ packet of lemon jelly



Preparation

1 Start by making the base. Crush the biscuits in a freezer bag using a rolling pin then place in a small saucepan containing the butter that has been melted. Add the star anise, mix well then place into the base of the cake tin, pressing down with the back of a spoon. Chill for about an hour.

2 Put the gelatine leaves in a jug of cold water and leave to soak for at least ten minutes.

3 To make the lemon curd. Place all the ingredients into a bowl placed over a pan of simmering water and whisk all the time until the mixture has thickened.

4 Whilst the lemon curd is still warm drop the gelatine leaves in and give a good mix to make sure it dissolves.

5 In a separate bowl whisk the mascarpone cheese with the icing sugar then gradually add the milk plus the lemon juice and zest. Finally whisk in the lemon curd/gelatine mix.

NB - if you use bought lemon curd you will need to heat it gently in a saucepan before adding the gelatine. Do not allow it to boil.

6 Take the chilled base from the freezer and use strawberry halves to line the sides of the tin. I use a strip of acetate to line the tin first. If you haven't got this baking parchment will work. Pour the cheesecake mix into the tin. Level the top then place into the fridge and leave to set for at least three hours but preferably overnight.

7 Make up a half pint of bought lemon jelly in a glass container. You may want to enhance the colour with a drop of yellow food colouring. Allow the jelly to set in the fridge. Once set, place the jelly and the container into a microwave and power for 10 seconds only and repeat, stirring in between blasts of power, until it just turns to liquid but is not hot. Carefully pour this over the set and chilled cheesecake. Return to the fridge for at least for 2 hours until set.

8 The next day and when ready to decorate - remove the cheesecake from the tin and decorate the top with strawberries and some lemon zests - the decoration is up to you!



Nancy Birtwhistle

Raspberry Ring Cake

This cake or dessert is very simple to make and can look quite stunning when fully decorated with a drizzle icing, flaked almonds, fresh raspberries and a dusting of icing sugar.



Makes 1 cake

Serves 6-8

Bake 170°C

Cooking 30 mins

Ingredients

- 175g margarine
- 175g caster sugar
- 100g ground almonds
- 100g gluten free flour
- 3 large eggs
- 150g fresh raspberries or if out of season use 100g dried red berries
- 1 tsp almond extract
- 2 tbsp flaked almonds lightly roasted
- Icing sugar and lemon juice to make a lemon drizzle icing for decoration
- Serve with fresh cream and fresh raspberries



Preparation

1 I use a savarin mould which should be well greased. Preheat the oven to 175 degrees fan.

2 Cream the margarine and sugar until light and fluffy. Then add the almond extract and the eggs one at a time, beating well between each addition. Fold in the ground almonds and gluten free flour. The mix needs to be quite stiff in order to hold the fruit. If using fresh raspberries, spoon half the mix into the tin, scatter in the fruit then spoon in the rest of the mix. If using dried berries, dust them in a spoonful of flour then fold into the mix then spoon into the prepared tin.

3 Gently level the mix then bake in the oven for 25-30 minutes until the cake is pale golden in colour. Leave in the tin for 5 minutes then turn out onto cooling rack and leave until cold.

4 Mix a runny icing with 2 tbsp lemon juice with sufficient icing sugar to make a white, runny icing about the consistency of single cream.

5 Pipe or spoon the icing over the cake then sprinkle with toasted flaked almonds and a dusting of icing sugar. If serving as a dessert, fill the centre with fresh raspberries then dust the whole thing with sifted icing sugar. Serve with single cream.

The Raspberry Ring Cake is a gluten free recipe which can also be made with wheat flour. Same weight as stated in recipe.
